Japan has long been an attractive destination for international association meetings. Now there is a new strategy designed to focus on the country's key industry sectors. Sally Trelford reports on Japan's innovative cities and how their strengths can assist your next association event

The power of industry

With the largest number of researchers per capita in Asia, there are lots of exciting opportunities for international associations to keep coming to Japan.

In order to continue to harness the power of its industry, Japan is now focusing on promoting its various industry clusters to the international association market. Seven cities have been selected by the Japan Tourism Agency as particularly strong in one or more key industry sectors. They include: Tokyo, Yokohama, Kyoto, Kobe, Fukuoka, Nagova and Osaka. This initiative derives from the growth strategy promoted by Prime Minister Abe and known as 'Japan Revitalization Strategy - Japan is Back, focusing in particular in the areas of 'Promoting Science, Technology and Innovation' and 'Creating and developing good health and longevity in industry'.

This new strategy is designed to help promote new meetings related to the key industry sectors of each city, which should in turn help each city to develop both its meeting industry and ensure the long-term health of its industry clusters.

Narita is the most common port of entry and is used by more than 34 million international passengers every year

Getting around: Japan's public transportation system is one of the world's largest and a global leader in terms of quality. The network of aviation and rail systems makes it possible for travellers to access almost all of the country easily, safely and comfortably. Within individual cities, subway and bus routes are well organised.

Tokyo hosted 225 congresses in 2012, placing it sixth in the world. Combined with a winning bid for the 2020 Olympic and Paralympic Games, Japan's capital has cemented its place amongst world cities; furthermore, firmly committed to building on its success with convention business, a five-year Tourism Plan launched this year, with a focus on providing subvention and support to large association meetings.

A fascinating mix of the old and the new, Tokyo retains its own distinct culture and traditions: a cuisine that covers traditional Japanese food and authentic foods from across the world and that has gained more Michelin stars than any other city in the world. Its numerous and diverse shopping areas are renowned and entertainments range from sumo, kabuki and bunraku to the latest musicals and shows. Unique excursion ideas include hands-on activities such as a traditional tea ceremony, flower arrangement and kimono wearing, while numerous famous attractions are within easy reach, including the volcanic scenery and hot springs of Hakone, and the temples and shrines in Kamakura and World Heritage Nikko.

Conventions are equally well-served by the impressive array of five-star and business hotels, most offering an excellent location and stylish Western design at a range of budgets. And some are on a huge scale. The three hotels in the Takanawa area, The Grand Prince Hotel Takanawa, The Grand Prince Hotel New Takanawa and the Shinagawa Prince Hotel combined, offer a total of more than 5,000 rooms and 46 banquet halls.




Roppongi: has more than 200 restaurants, cafes, boutiques and event spaces, an art museum and gallery, Cineplex and City View.

Tokyo's two modern international airports handle all major carriers, providing great access globally. Narita Airport offers more than 1,500 international flights per week from 98 cities around the world. Haneda Airport serves 18 cities worldwide with 350 flights every week.

"The academic significance of choosing Tokyo as the venue for the International Union of Nutritional Sciences resides in the competency of Japanese scientists, who have acquired a deep knowledge in basic, applied and clinical nutrition. Strong support from the capital as a leading convention city together with the rich attractions of the city, great access from around the world and its safe and clean environment, are among those factors that make Tokyo a perfect place for this scientific gathering.

In addition, the Tokyo Metropolitan Government has promised to secure both financial and non-financial support, such as subsidies, complimentary Tokyo city tours, complimentary cultural programmes and visitor information both at the airport and congress venue, co-ordination of street banners and a city guidebook and map for all congress delegates. The Tokyo Convention and Visitors Bureau essentially supported the preparation of the bid paper and presentation materials.

Yokohama

Located just 30 minutes from Metropolitan Tokyo by road or rail, Yokohama is a beautiful port city that opened its gates to the world 150 years ago. It was in Yokohama that international culture and products were introduced and spread throughout Japan, making Yokohama a city with a unique blend of Japanese and world cultures. The city offers diverse experiences, from authentic Japanese customs to an exciting world-class metropolis,

Yokohama has been the nation's key entry point for international trade and engagement. which has resulted in a fusion of global perspectives with local expertise. Today, Yokohama is the nation's centre for innovation in science and technology, designated as the 'International Strategic Zone for Life Sciences' by the Japanese government. Having clusters of universities, R&D and industries in the life science field, it provides the network knowledge quotient that all delegates to conferences seek.

From being the first Japanese port to open up, to hosting first-time-in-Asia congresses, and the first in innovation and research and development, Yokohama's open 'can-do' approach has made it Japan's first port of call.

Whether it is a high profile meeting such as APEC (2011, 8,000 attendees) or association congresses with wide socio-economic implications such as the 10th Annual Meeting for the International Society for Stem Cell Research (2012, 3,500 attendees) and the 28th International Congress of Chemotherapy and Infection (2013, 1,500 attendees), Yokohama can cater to any, with its extensive range of facilities from international brand hotels to a world-class convention complex. Japan's active trade and professional association community also means a high number of local participants for international association congresses.

Yokohama Museum of Art An art museum featuring a collection of more than 10,000 pieces of modern art, including works of Yokohama-related artists. The Grand

Gallery, the eighth-floor observatory deck and art galleries are available for receptions of 30 to 350 guests.

A pillar-free hall of 2,000 sqm situated at the entrance to the port and offering magnificent views of the bay and the city. The floors and walls are made of wood, reminiscent of a ship's deck. It can accommodate 600 guests for seated banquets or 1,200 guests buffet style,

Worth a visit

Yokohama Sankeien Garden

Take a stroll in an authentic Japanese garden with an area of 175,000 sqm, graced with flowers and greenery in every season. Well preserved and historically important buildings were relocated here from Kyoto and Kamakura. Receptions and cultural programmes can be held in a traditional Japanese style reception hall, Kakushokaku.

Yokohama Landmark Tower Sky Garden

Enjoy the panoramic sweeping 360-degree view of Yokohama city, Tokyo and Mt Fuji from the observatory on the 69th floor of the Landmark Tower Building. The high-speed elevator takes visitors from the ground floor up to 273 metres in just 40 seconds.

Kamakura

Visit the beautiful shrines and temples of Japan's medieval capital of Kamakura. The Great Buddha, a bronze image depicting Buddha in a seated meditative pose is 11.4m in height and one of the many popular tourist spots in the vicinity.

"I have previously organised two large congresses - the Japanese Society of Pathology with 2,700 attendees and the Japanese Society of Clinical Cytology (JSCC) with 4,300 attendees - at PACIFICO Yokohama and both were very satisfactory. This is the reason why I selected PACIFICO Yokohama for this event.

Before bidding for the Congress site selection, we organised a 'Team Japan', which was composed of members from JNTO, Yokohama Convention & Visitors Bureau and PACIFICO Yokohama. They offered a great deal of support including the organisation of a site visit to Yokohama and Kyoto, and organising promotional events such as 'Japan Night' during the Lisbon and Paris IAC meetings.

The final selection for the 2016 congress was completed at the 17th ICC at Edinburgh in 2010, and we won against a very strong competitor, Sydney, Australia. 'Team Japan' has promised to maintain support to JSCC to ensure the success of the International Congress of Cytology (ICC) Yokohama 2016."

The birthplace of kabuki, and a landmark of the city, performances have been designated as an important cultural property. Concerts and rakugo (traditional comic storytelling) performances are also held here.

Taizoin Zen Buddhist Temple

A 600-year-old Zen Buddhist temple and its garden are available for use as a reception venue as well as a place to experience Zen meditation, calligraphy, a tea ceremony, shojin temple cuisine and other aspects of a Zen priest's daily life.

Visit some of the most famous World Heritage Sites:

Kamigamo-jinja, Shimogamo-jinja, Kiyomizu-dera Temple, Kinkakuji (the Golden Pavillion) and Nijo Castle.



Kyoto is located in the centre of Japan, easily accessible from all international gateways. Kansai International Airport is just over one hour away from Kyoto.



The cultural heart of Japan, capital from 794 to 1868, Kyoto has more than 2,000 Buddhist temples and Shinto shrines and 17 UNESCO World Heritage Sites. With a history of more than 1,200 years of global hospitality, Kyoto sees hospitality as the highest of art forms, offering visitors warm service and personalised attention. Today, Kyoto also writes world history, from the Kyoto Protocol to international gatherings at the Kyoto State Guest House and provides superb venues, both modern and historic - and unrivalled cultural experiences. Such is the global attraction of Kyoto, it has recently been voted the world's number two (Wanderlust, 2011) and number three (Conde Nast Traveler, 2012) favourite city.

As the heart of traditional Japanese culture, the city has many local specialities. Try cuisine including kyo-gashi (traditional sweets), kyo-tsukemono (local pickled vegetables), Fushimi sake and kyokaiseki (Japanese haute cuisine) or indulge in the epitome of Kyoto hospitality as geisha (known as Geiko and Maiko in Kyoto) from five thriving schools in the city entertain you with their famed willowy dances and haunting songs. Or wander the twisting streets and hidden lanes and discover some of Kyoto's history and secrets for yourself.







Hiroshima

The two UNESCO World Heritage Sites of Hiroshima represent the dual aspects of the city: the A-bomb Dome is a lasting memorial to world peace, while the beautiful island shrine of Itsukushima is dedicated to the glories of Japanese art and culture. Hosting more than 300 MICE events a year, the city's convention zone is based around the Peace Memorial Park in which stands the International Conference Centre Hiroshima. With many hotels and convention venues located within walking distance of each other, this compact city can accommodate both small meetings and conventions with 10,000 delegates easily and conveniently.

Known as the City of Water, with six beautiful rivers flowing through it, Hiroshima gazes out at the Seto Inland Sea, and is famous for its seafood, especially oysters, as well as Hiroshima-style okonomiyaki and sake. You can cruise through the city on a river boat, and a cruise is a must upon the sea. There are a variety of options ranging from a large ship across the Seto Inland Sea to a kayak, on which you can sail, at high tide, through the Otorii-Gate of the Shrine.

Worth a visit

Hiroshima Castle and Shukkeien Garden

Take a walking tour and have a tea break in the garden designed by a great tea master of the 17th century.

Miyajima Walk

Miyajima is much more than the Itsukushima Shrine. Discover an unknown Miyajima, a sacred island with a long history of 1,400 years. A walk through the maze-like town of Miyajima is also interesting.

Peace Memorial Park and A-Bomb Dome

More than 120,000 sqm of park with the Peace Memorial Museum and the A-bomb Dome: a lasting memorial to world peace, a UNESCO World Heritage Site and a tangible link to Hiroshima's unique past.

Matsuda (Mazda) Museum

A must for any automobile fan.



Two flights a day out of Narita Airport; 17 flights a day out of Haneda. Just over two hours by train from Kansai International Airport. There are also international flights to/from Hiroshima Airport.



Often referred to as 'little Kyoto' for its many superb historical sites, Kanazawa is both a beautiful city and a centre for many cultural traditions such as noh drama and Kaga yuzen fabric dyeing craft, still very much alive today. Japanese sweets and desserts, first associated with the tea ceremony, are also still loved by many people here. The city is surrounded by some of Japan's most beautiful natural scenery, including the nearby Noto Peninsula and the Echizen Kaga Coast Quasi-National Park. There are also several onsen (hot springs) resorts. Key venues here include Ishikawa Ongakudo, one of three halls designed for traditional Japanese music performances which enjoy direct access to Kanazawa Station and can accommodate up to 1,500. Other special venues include 21st Century Museum of Contemporary Art, Kanazawa and it is well worth visiting the ruins of Kanazawa Castle, old samurai residences, the famous Kenrokuen landscape garden and Myoryu-ji Temple (Ninja Temple). Komatsu Airport has direct flights from Seoul and Shanghai, the Hokuriku Expressway connects Kanazawa to major cities and, from 2015, the Hokuriku Shinkansen line will directly connect the city to Tokyo.
